Thanks to a donation of 12 sheets of plywood by Rick of Plum Creek Plywood, Columbia Falls, we were able to finish the agriculture building.

I always try to consolidate trips, so on the way home, I stopped in Kalispell to finish out my load with antiques, collectibles, etc. surplus by Flathead County from the old museum south of town. This was facilitated by Jessie Malone,


Flathead Museum board member, and Mike Pence, Flathead County Administrator, and approved by the Flathead Co. Commissioners. In the mix were numerous boxes of maps and records dating back to 1906. Of course Polson was a part of Flathead County until 1923, so some items were pertinent to local history.

Paul Bunyan plans unearthed!

Imagine my excitement when I found two files totaling 2 ½ inches thick of all the correspondence concerning the need for and the building of the Paul Bunyan Logging Tow Boat for Somers Lumber Co. which was owned by Great Northern Railway. Discovering the blueprints of the boat and the operating manual for the engine was the frosting on the cake.

One of the pieces in the photo below is a signed letter by L.E. Geary, naval architect, engineer, and broker, the most notable ship designer on the west coast. The other paper is the certificate of the engine for the Paul Bunyan stating it had passed all tests and was suitable for use. Dated 24 July 1926.

I've been told that building the cover over the Paul Bunyan should start soon.

MISCELLANEOUS DONATIONS

Item donations are sometimes overwhelming. I do not always feature them right away, as I want to do more research on their use and history. A couple of large items will wait until they tie in with another related item or story.

Here are a few for this last quarter:

Carl Skabronski – cash donation as well as several antique tools, etc. My favorites were a leather mail bag that hung over the saddlehorn and was used between Salmon, Idaho and Missoula around the turn of the last century. The other item is in the category of “Sweetheart Jewelry” and is a WWII gold and mother of pearl “Son in the service” locket. I have never found one in the original pouch, case, and box before;



Howard Hudson – ‘40s and ‘50s era labeled cans and bottles, matchbooks, Glacier Park souvenirs, etc.;

Pat Deyo – brass Pyrene fire extinguisher, Pflueger rod and reel, etc.;

Dick Giffin – glass- throw ball fire extinguishers;

Chuck Harris – Cub and Boy Scout uniforms from 1954 thru 1964, army uniform from 1966 thru 1969, US Forest Service, and fire dept. uniforms from 1970 thru 2000;

Gene Hensen – child’s handmade, hand-pulled bobsled;

Chuck Trembley – cameras, valve grinding machines, automotive tools, etc.;

Darold Schaffer – horse hames, automotive tools, etc.;

Tom Needham – projectors and fixed gun sight assembly;

Greta Johnston – Three leather horse collars, three display boards of mounted 18” lengths of vintage barb wire totaling about 100 pieces, books on barb wire history;

Jim Gerrity – LA International circa 1930’s stationary engine, in memory of Bernard Gerrity;



Bob Skans – Vietnam War folding, wheeled stretcher;

Bob Lassila – WWII photograph scrapbook, etc.;

Dr. Paul Hanson – Two loads of scrap metal, plumbing fittings, dribs and dabs of oil and prestone from a garage clean out. NOTE I can often use bits of metal

for sculptures or restoration, and the rest I recycle as a fund raiser. Odd

leftover oil and prestone, get used in the antique engines, etc. Often times,

license plates show up in the corners or nailed to the wall. We are getting low on those we sell in our gift shop

and I also need to find some for our display collection or to coincide with the year of our display vehicles;

Gary Mahugh – Large CO₂ fire extinguisher for use in blacksmith shop, etc.;


Jim Schultz – National Cash Register Co. Credit File (*at left*) that would have been used in early day stores for charging customers, and three vintage fire extinguishers;
